What is the Pupil Premium?

The Pupil Premium is an allocation of additional funding given to schools in England to raise the attainment of specific groups of pupils who are at risk of underachievement. Pupils eligible for Pupil Premium Funding include:

- Pupils eligible for free school meals
- Ever 6 pupils pupils who have been eligible for free school meals at some point in the last six years
- Armed Service children
- Looked After Children pupils who have been looked after for 1 day or more or were adopted from care on or after 30 December 2005 or left care under: a Special Guardianship Order on or after 30 December 2005 / a Residence Order on or after 14 October 1991.

Covid-19

Due to the world-wide Coronavirus Pandemic in 2020, schools nationally received additional funding to support pupils to catch up on missed learning. This is referred to as the Catch Up Premium. Rationale

Our key objective is to narrow the attainment gap between disadvantaged and non-disadvantaged pupils. We use internal and external data to analyse the performance of different groups of learners and from this identify strategies and interventions to address underperformance. We consider not only pupils' academic attainment but their physical, social and emotional health which may impact or hinder their performance.

Evidence based research (Education Endowment Foundation Pupil Premium Report) has supported strategic planning and contributed to the formulation of the Pupil Premium Strategy 2020-2021. A tiered approach to Pupil Premium spending has been adopted which includes staff development, targeted support in the acquisition of basic skills and improving attendance, behaviour and providing social and emotional support.

In school barriers to learning

- Lower starting points on entry to nursery, particularly in the Prime Areas of Personal, Social and Emotional Development and Communication and Language and Physical Development in the Early Years Foundation Stage Curriculum.
- Poor attendance and punctuality for some pupils.
- Lower starting points in the core areas of Reading, Writing and Mathematics.
- Lack of funding for pupils with complex special educational needs has meant that these pupils are supported through the school's limited
 resources, impacting on the available support of teaching assistants to deliver interventions and catch up programmes to disadvantaged
 learners.

Out of school barriers to learning

- Low expectations from some families; low aspirations.
- Turbulence at home mental health issues, drug and alcohol abuse, domestic violence, financial strains which can heighten children's anxiety levels and impact on their ability to concentrate.
- Attendance and punctuality are poor for some children.
- Lack of parental engagement in helping children to consolidate learning at home through homework activities.
- Engagement in Remote/Home Learning during the COVID-19 Pandemic.
